Reports: Annual

The Annual reports of the City Clerk, Superintendent of the Water & Light Department, Secretary & Treasurer of the Library, Chairman of Board of Trustees Memorial Auditorium and Captain Bigler of Battery "B" 161 Kansas were inspected and duly approved by the City Governing Body.

Reports: Monthly

The monthly reports of the City Clerk, City Treasurer, Supt. Water & Light Dept., Police Judge, the quarterly report of the City Treasurer and the semi-monthly report of the Manager of the City Market were inspected and duly approved.

Appointments: Members of Library Board

Acting upon the recommendation of Mayor Gibson, the City Governing Body duly reappointed C. M. Thomas and C. A. Novak as members of the Library Board for the four year term ending February 1st, 1940. The City Clerk was instructed to notify the gentlemen of their reappointment.

Appropriation Ordinance No. 687

An ordinance making an appropriation in the sum of Sixteen Thousand Three Hundred Seventy and 52/100 (\$16,370.52) Dollars to pay the expenses of the city was introduced and put upon its first reading. Read the first time and under the rules was put upon its second and final reading. Read the second time, considered by sections, and put upon its final passage. The question being, shall the ordinance pass? A vote was taken which resulted in Ayes three, Nays none. The vote being unanimous for, the ordinance was declared passed.

Salary and Services of Certain City Employees:

Acting upon the recommendation of Mayor Gibson, the salary of Warren Judd, Police Officer was increased to \$110 per month, the same to be effective as of January 1st, 1936.

Acting upon the recommendation of Commissioner Johnson, the services of A. W. Pearce as Manager of the City Market was discontinued as of January 1st, 1936 and W. G. Lambert the present sweeper operator was named Manager of the Market in his place. Said Lambert to continue to receive his present salary of \$ 90.00 per month.

January 7th, 1936 a petition purporting to be signed by 1395 electors of the City of Ottawa, Kansas was filed with the City Clerk respectfully petitioning the Governing Body of said city to call a special election in the City of Ottawa, Kansas for the purpose of submitting to the electors of said city the proposition of returning to the Council form of City Government as provided for by law.

Ordinance: First Reading: Dairy Inspector

An ordinance creating the office of dairy inspector of the City of Ottawa, Kansas, prescribing the duties of such office, and fixing the term and salary thereof, repealing ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, the same being an ordinance for the immediate preservation of the public health of said city was introduced and put upon its first reading. Read the first time and under the rules was laid over until its second and final reading.

Bonds: Pool-Halls and Bowling Alleys.

The proprietors of the Monarch and Brunswick Billiard Parlors and the Marvin E. Johnson Bowling Alley filed with the City Clerk their respective bonds in amount of \$ 1000.00 each for the calendar year 1936, the same being duly approved by the City Governing Body and on file in the office of the City Clerk.

Health & Sanitation Order: Franklin County Fair Ass'n.


Due to repeated and insistent complaints to the Governing Body of this city from the health authorities as to filthy & unsanitary conditions in and around sales pavillion, hog and cattle barns in Forest Park, an immediate clean-up of these premises is demanded with insistance that that portion of the park by kept clean and sanitary. Hogs cannot be kept upon these premises as is being done throughout a considerable portion of the year.

Your agreement with the city provides for the use of the Park not to exceed a ten day period each year for the purpose of holding a County Fair and you are notified that if further complaint is had about the unsanitary condition of these premises, such agreement will be strictly enforced.


Zoning: Appeal from ruling of Building Inspector


Petition: Council Form of City Government; Sufficient

The minutes of the regular meeting of January 22nd 1936 were inspected and duly approved by the City Governing Body.

Resolution: To Improve & Repair 5th st, Main to Ash

WHEREAS, the Governing Body of the City of Ottawa, Kansas deems it necessary to pave, repave, curb, recurb, gutter, regutter, resurface, repair and otherwise improve 5th street in said city from the west line of Main street to the east line of Ash street, and that said improvement is necessary to be done, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF OTTAWA, KANSAS:

That it is necessary to pave, repave, curb, recurb, gutter, regutter, resurface, repair and otherwise improve that portion of 5th street in said city lying between the west line of Main street and the east line of Ash street by turning and repairing of said sand filled brick pavement, replacing with new brick where necessary and finishing with asphalt joint filler, repairing and replacing 4" concrete foundation where necessary and repairing and replacing 24" combined curb and gutter where necessary; Provided that the above improvement shall be approved as a work-relief, public-improvement, or public-works project by the Federal Government as authorized under the acts of the Congress of the United States.

The foregoing resolution was duly adopted by a unanimous vote of the City Governing Body this 29th day of January 1936.

Resolution: Improve & Repair Willow st-2nd to 10th.

WHEREAS, the Governing Body of the City of Ottawa, Kansas deems it necessary to pave, repave, grade, regrade, gutter, regutter, curb, recurb, resurface, repair and otherwise improve Willow street in said city from the south line of 2nd street to the south line of 10th street and that said improvement is necessary, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF OTTAWA, KANSAS:

That it is necessary to pave, repave, grade, regrade, curb, recurb, gutter, regutter, resurface, repair and otherwise improve that portion of Willow street in said city lying between the south line of 2nd street to the south line of 10th street as follows, to-wit:

Between Second street and Third street by paving with new 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " vertical fibre brick with an asphalt filler on scarified macadam prepared base.

(over)

Between Third street and Ninth street by turning brick, replacing with new brick where necessary, and finishing with an asphalt filler, repairing 4" concrete foundation where necessary, and by repairing and replacing 24" combined curb & gutter where necessary.

Between Ninth street and Tenth street by turning brick and widening pavement to a width of Twenty-five feet by constructing strips of concrete slab with lip type curb adjacent to present pavement and grading parkings and providing necessary drainage for the same.

PROVIDED, that the above improvement shall be approved as a work-relief, public-employment or public-works project by the Federal Government as authorized under the acts of the Congress of the United States.

The foregoing resolution was duly adopted by a unanimous vote of the City Governing Body January 29th, 1936.

Bond Purchase Authorized: Hope Cem. Perpetual Care Fund

Acting upon the recommendation of H. E. Rodgers, Commissioner of Finance and Revenue, the City Governing Body duly authorized the purchase of \$ 600.00 in Federal Farm Mortgage 3% Bonds dated May 15th, 1934 and maturing May 15th, 1949 at the present market price of 101 16/32 per ϕ . Said bonds when purchased to be placed in the hands of the City Treasurer to the credit of the Hope Cemetery Perpetual Care Fund.

Bond Purchase Authorized: Julia M. Walsh Cemetery Lot Perpetual Care Fund.

Acting upon the recommendation of H. E. 

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF OTTAWA, KANSAS:



WHEREAS, such grant has been made by the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works in an amount not to exceed in any event the sum of \$81,000.00, now, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE CITY OF OTTAWA, KANSAS:

That a necessity exists and that said Board of Education finds and determines that it is necessary to secure a site for, and to erect and equip a new grade school building to replace the present Field School in said city, and to erect and equip an addition to Hawthorne School Building, and that it is necessary to provide funds for said purposes.

That the estimated cost of securing said site and of all of said improvements is in the total amount of \$206,000.00, and that in addition to the Federal grant of money in the maximum sum of \$81,000.00 which will be available for such purposes, it is necessary to issue bonds of the Board of Education in the principal sum of \$125,000.00, and that the proceeds of said bonds, together with the amount of Federal Funds granted as aforesaid, will be used for said purposes.





BY THE COURT:

In the case of Ash VS Gibson, et al., No. 13,395, on August 1st of this year an application was filed for injunction to restrain the City of Ottawa, or officers of the City of Ottawa from enforcement of an ordinance. That ordinance was No. 1593, and had to do with transportation of gasoline in trucks through the city in quantities of less than 600 gallons, with certain exceptions and providing penalties for violation of it. A restraining order was issued, restraining the enforcement of the ordinance and upon August 13th evidence was presented and arguments were offered in support of the contentions of the plaintiffs and those of the defendants who have answered for temporary injunction.

To my mind the whole matter must be decided upon the right of the city to pass the kind of an ordinance it has passed with the effect that the evidence shows, and anybody who knows anything of the situation must take notice of, upon the transportation of gasoline or other products of an inflammable nature.

The cities in this state are the creatures of the legislature. In other words, the cities are the children of the legislature and the only rights which the cities have, whether it be a first, second or third class city, comes from the legislature. Some states have constitutional provisions in regard to the organization of cities and the government and management thereof, but apparently in this state the whole matter is left to the good judgement and discretion of the members of the legislature. And so, to

(over)

repeat, the only power which the city has is derived from acts of the legislature. The legislature of this state has given the cities wide and varied powers in connection with the regulation of its affairs. But, where a given act does not fall within the general power given the city, or within some special authority given the city, the city is without power to enact legislation in connection therewith. Of course, as I said at the time, this matter was presented before, I think the city has power to regulate, possibly the time of day that trucks of the nature we are dealing with can pass through the city, the route they can take, the speed they move at, and things of that kind. I do not think there is any question about that. It is suggested by the city that if they follow entirely the line of argument presented by the plaintiffs, the city would be powerless to move in the matter. I do not think so. That is a personal matter of the driver of the truck, not of the truck itself. The driver would be amenable to any reasonable regulation the city might make in regard to speed, route or things of that kind.

So I think we can eliminate regulatory matters which the city has power to promulgate in the administration of its affairs. I have not a doubt but what the city could, within the confines of its territorial limits, prohibit the delivery of gasoline or other inflammables in quantities above certain limits, provided those limits reasonable. It can prohibit trucks of the nature we are dealing with here from making general deliveries in the city. It can prevent the trucks from parking or staying more than what would be a reasonable time than necessarily required in the city, but whether or not the city has power to prohibit and deny the use of the streets of the city, I have very serious doubts.

The transportation of gasoline is a legitimate enterprise. It is one that the highways of the state is used for. The streets of any city, not Ottawa alone, while they do not belong to the public, yet at the same time they are offered to the public as a service for traffic by which they can go from one place to another within the state.

It is my judgment that the City cannot, under the laws of this state, prohibit a gasoline truck from using the streets of the city as a means of travelling from one place to another within the state.

It isn't entirely analagous, but a state may not pass any law which will prevent the free use of its highways, bridges, etc., to the cars of other states that may desire to come into it. I may lay down certain regulations for the way that its highways shall be used, yet they must apply as well to the residents of the state as to those who come into it.

I think the city is supreme in the regulations it may pass in reference to what goes on within the territorial limits of the city with reference to the depth, for instance, that the gasoline shall be buried, tanks that it is

(over)

put in shall be buried, and things along that line with reference to delivery, etc., but my best judgment, under the authorities, is, the city has not the power to pass and enforce an ordinance of the character we have here.

The case of the 93 Kans. cited in support of the plaintiffs' position is a case where they had a man that had a garage or machine shop in the city and it prohibited the trucks of certain weight and character from using the street so that they could not reach his place of business. That was said to be unconstitutional and without the power of the city to pass it. Not long ago, in the northern part of the state, I forget the town, it seems either Holton or Horton, some place up in there, in an effort to protect the interests of local merchants an ordinance was passed prohibiting the peddling of bread by outside bakers unless a certain license fee was paid. The license fee was of such a nature that the supreme court said it was confiscatory, arbitrary and ultra vires and was so great it attempted to prohibit. So, in this case, while they leave a route by which trucks of the nature mentioned can get into the city and out again, yet they are required to take a road that amounts practically to a detour so far as destination is concerned they hope to arrive at.

I am inclined to think this temporary injunction should be allowed and that is the order.

Ordinance: First Reading: License Tax - Motor Busses

An ordinance laying a license tax on motor busses and providing for the collection thereof, and regulating the occupation and business of operating motor busses for the transportation of passengers for hire within the City of Ottawa, Kansas, and providing penalties for the violation thereof, was introduced and put upon its first reading. Read the first time and under the rules was laid over until its second and final reading.

In the matter of the application of the City of Ottawa, Franklin County, Kansas for an order approving the plans, specifications and estimates for the construction of a dam in the Marais des Cygnes River for the purpose of impounding an additional water supply for the said city.

IN FURTHER SUPPORT of our application for an order approving the plans, specifications and estimates for the construction of a dam in the Marais des Cygnes River for the purpose of impounding an additional supply of water for this city, which such plans etc. were compiled and are handed you herewith in accordance with the instructions of the Secretary of your commission, we wish to point out and call to your attention that the issuance of bonds is not a factor in this proceeding for the reason that the City of Ottawa has ample utility funds on hand with which to pay the cost of the contemplated improvement. It appears, therefore, that procedure should be in accordance with the provisions of Item 16 of 24-407, Revised Statutes of Kansas, 1923.

Further, we wish to point out that, following a threatened water shortage in 1931, this city retained The Clark E. Jacoby Engineering Company of Kansas City, Missouri to report on means of providing an additional supply of water, such report to be supplemental to its previous report on sources of water supply for the city made in 1919.

The construction proposed now is in accordance with the recommendations in the 1931 report and the completion of the project is regarded as of the utmost importance to the city in view of the serious shortages of water in 1934 and 1936. The stored supply of water, and that available by ditching, was entirely exhausted in 1934 and in 1936 it was necessary to install pumps and draw water from pools after the supply available by ditching was exhausted. During both of these years it was necessary to curtail the use of water and in 1936 the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railroad Company was obliged to secure water for its locomotives elsewhere.

Simultaneously with this action, we are making application to the Chief Engineer, Division of Water Resources, State of Kansas for his permission to build this dam as required by law and we trust our application to both agencies may be considered at a joint hearing.






